Hyde:

- “Hissing intake of breath”
- “You should have my address”





- “Snarled into a savage laugh”

CHAPTER 3

- “Lanyon called my scientific heresies.” (Jekyll’s explanation of failed friendship w/ Lanyon due to Lanyon disapproving his actions against God)
- “Jekyll grew pale to the very lips” (when Utterson’s raises his concerns over Hyde’s intentions)
- Jekyll admits his “very great interest in Mr. Hyde”
- Utterson’s “irrepressible sigh”

CHAPTER 4

- “Fog rolled over the city in the small hours.”

Account of a maid who witnessed the murder:

- “She was romantically given”
- “She felt more at peace with men and felt kindly about the world.”
- “Aware of a beautiful gentleman with white hair (purity?- as he was a respectable figure in society)
- “Ape-like fury”
- “Clubbed him to the earth”
- “Audibly shattered”
- “Small stature” (helps to indicate his position in evolution - was not entirely formed linking back to “deformity”)
- “Dismal quarter of Soho” (Soho seems to be the location of evil in Victorian society) *mind=blown*

- “His blood ran cold” (shock, a bit self-explanatory ngl)

- “Rosy man had grown pale” (drained of happiness/innocence after discovering truth)
 - “Visibly bolder and older” (of course, the draining of Lanyon’s life had led to the acceleration of age)
 - “Ill looks”
 - “Doomed man”

Jekyll's unnerving demeanour:

- “Smile struck out of his face”
- “Succeeded by an expression of such abject terror and despair.”
- “Froze the blood of the 2 gentlemen [Utterson and Enfield]”

Utterson's uneasiness:

- “They were both pale”
 - “Answering horror in their eyes”
 - “God forgive us! God forgive us!” (Biblical: displays horror as Utterson is turning to God to rid sins committed)
